British Values

Why do we have British Values?

One of the reasons that British values are so important is that they help to prepare young people for life in modern Britain as they grow older and leave school. Another reason why British values are so important is that they form an important element of safeguarding children, as they are intended as a preventative measure against extremism and radicalisation.

British values were first introduced in schools and early years settings in 2014 when the Department for Education (DfE) published its British values guidance, stating the purpose as: 'to create and enforce a clear and rigorous expectation on all education settings to promote the fundamental British values of democracy, the rule of law, individual liberty, mutual respect and tolerance of those of different faiths and beliefs.' The guidance states that all education settings have a duty to promote British values.

In playgroup we promote British Values through daily routines and specific, planned activities.

The main teaching principles for children learning about British values

Democracy: making decisions together, for example giving opportunities to develop enquiring minds in an atmosphere where questions are valued.

In playgroup we help children to have their say and make choices in an environment that is safe and supportive e.g. Voting for the next theme, book to read, game to play etc.



Rule of law: understanding rules matter as shown in Personal Social and Emotional development for example collaborating with children to create rules and codes of behaviour. In playgroup we help children to understand right from wrong, e.g. taking turns, sharing, kind hands etc

Individual liberty: freedom for all, for example reflecting on our differences and understanding we are free to have different opinions.

In playgroup we help children to appreciate this by modelling behaviour that shows we welcome all and celebrate differences etc.

Mutual respect: treat others as you want to be treated, for example sharing and respecting other's opinions.

In playgroup we help children to show respect to one another e.g. being polite, using please and thank you, showing praise for the efforts of others etc.

Tolerance: Having tolerance of others, their religion, culture. Together we are one community who care respect and understand one another.

In playgroup we help the children to show tolerance by modelling a positive and supportive environment where each and everyone is safe to have their say, where different beliefs and cultures are celebrated and we understand that we are all different etc.
